

















FOREWORD

This meeting is organised within the framework of the research project "Archaeology of local societies in Southern Europe: identities, collectives and territorialities (5th-11th centuries)" PID2020-112506GB-C41 funded by the Spanish Ministry of Science and Innovation (https://enproyectosocloc.wordpress.com), and in collaboration with the Institute for Medieval Studies (IEM – NOVA FCSH).

The aim of this meeting is to study the behaviours, practices, and uses of material culture, taking local societies as a conceptual and operational perspective. The notion of local societies is ambiguous because it has been used with different contents and meanings. In our research project, the concept is defined in a triple dimension: (a) as an arena of dense interaction between local communities and surrounding societies and powers, in which exchange mechanisms and specific patterns of rationality are articulated; (b) as a sociopolitical space of variable geometry over time that determines the degree of localisation of practices and social life; (c) as an instrument to establish meaningful comparisons between different geographies and time frames.

In particular, it is intended to take into consideration ceramic materials, which constitute the most abundant and frequent item in archaeological sites. These materials have been analysed mainly from the perspective of production, distribution, and interchange mechanisms. In this way, it has been possible to construct solid narratives and modelling of past economies taking into consideration everyday commodities. However, less frequent are the works that start from the contexts of consumption and the perspective of the cultural biography of the objects. This meeting aims to analyse aspects related to the identity and sense of belonging of individuals and groups, strategies of distinction, the social value of objects, and the way in which material culture defines status and levels of social stratification. Some of the questions to be addressed include how to differentiate the necessary from the superfluous? when, how and why forms of ceramic replacement are different within local societies? how do everyday objects contribute to shaping social life? to what extent are ceramics representative of large-scale economic, cultural and social dynamics? are there differences in the forms of ceramic consumption of subaltern and elite groups? how do intermediate groups or local elites employ material culture to obtain, negotiate and consolidate their position?

We want to develop these issues from a European comparative framework, considering data and models proposed for different regions and allowing us to analyse different local practices and dynamics. We would also like to have specialists working on local consumption dynamics at times that transcend the chronological framework of the project, as well as perspectives from other scientific areas.
